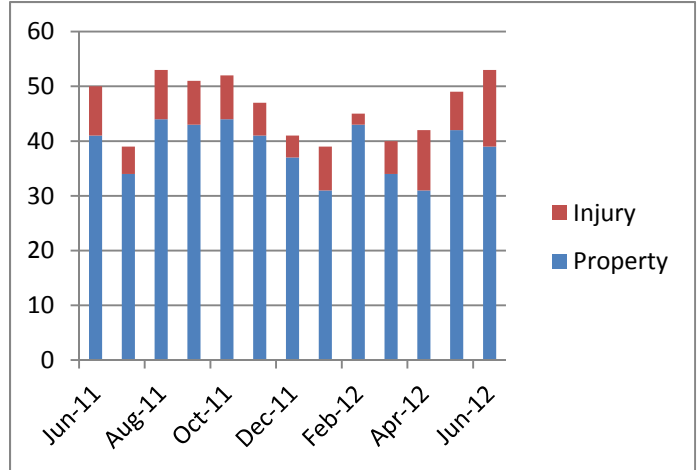
Performance Management Statistics:



Total Calls for Service

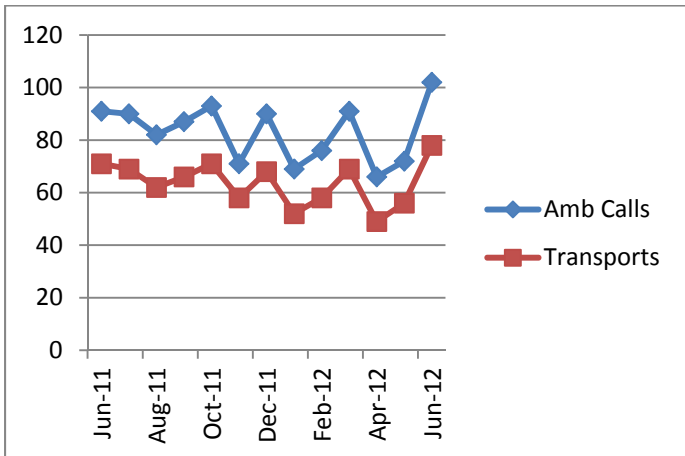


Arrests - Adult & Juvenile

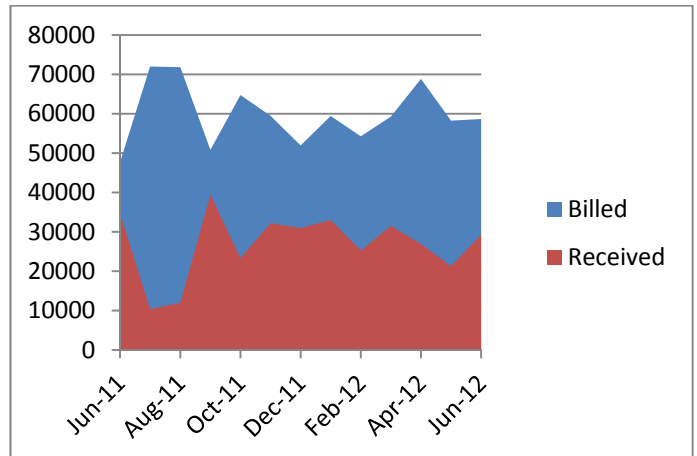

Cases of Interest:

With devastating wildfires around the State, the community has become very concerned about fireworks this year (and rightly so). Nearly as soon as the fireworks booths opened, we began getting calls asking where it was illegal to use fireworks and complaining that people are lighting fireworks even in areas where they are legal. So far, through July 1st, officers have responded on nine complaints of fireworks use and nine complaints of possible fires, all in the latter part of June.

Family fights and domestic abuse continue to be areas of concern, as officers responded to forty-nine such cases, and another twenty-nine family problems involving juveniles. In one case a father was talking to his son about his granddaughter. That, mixed with alcohol, was apparently enough to cause a heated exchange which resulted in the son tackling his father... just prior to getting arrested. In another case of father-son violence, a man in his twenties decided to assault his stepdad, bringing him to the attention of officers... who then discovered three warrants with bail amounts totaling more than \$1,700 and (of course) the drug paraphernalia in the man's pocket..

Our Springville drug officer made an arrest of a local heroin user last month. This person was charged with drug crimes and agreed to a plea deal to provide information on his supplier. The supplier was in West Valley City. We worked with Utah County Major Crimes and West Valley City Police to make undercover buys and then serve a warrant on the supplier. Officers seized over a pound of heroin and ½ pound of methamphetamine,

ready for sale. Two individuals who are known to supply for several local users were arrested on distribution charges.

Traffic:

Officers responded to fifty-six traffic collisions during June, with fourteen of those resulting in injuries to one or more persons. Traffic officers continue to target areas of town, as well as offenses that are listed as the most common causes of accidents (failure to yield right-of-way and following too close). On the last day of the month, one of our officers had to get out of the way of a motorist as he was on a traffic stop to keep from being struck. The woman continued to drive away, and the officer had to jump on his motorcycle and chase after her. Once stopped, she said that she, 'knew she wasn't going to hit' the officer. And while she claimed she wasn't trying to get away, the officer had to follow her for blocks to get her to stop. Fortunately the officer was not injured. The officer's motorcycle wasn't so fortunate. Because a Harley Davidson motorcycle can't jump out of the way, the woman's car hit the rear-view mirror on the bike. The mirror will need to be replaced...

Animal Control:

Our animal control officers handled about two hundred assorted types of complaints this month. Complaints about 'wild animals' made a jump this month, as raccoons, skunks and rock chucks have begun moving around the city. But that isn't all. Our officers also picked up snakes, injured ducks and small rabbits from homes here in town. Sadly, they also have had complaints of people locking their pets in their vehicles, windows rolled up and parked in the sun... while the owners went into an air conditioned business to enjoy a meal.
