

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE S.R. 77 (400 SOUTH)



The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) has completed widening and reconstructing 400 South between I-15 and Spanish Fork Main Street (2600 West). The project has also added another eastbound to northbound turn lane at the 400 South interchange to improve traffic flow.

Beginning Sept. 5, 2018 UDOT will resurface a four-mile segment of S.R. 77 from U.S. 89 (Main Street) to 2600 West. Construction crews will place a thin layer

of asphalt to seal the existing pavement and extend the life of the roadway. Crews will also repair the bridge transition areas where 400 South crosses over the Union Pacific railroad tracks at approximately 1500 West. Drivers should anticipate moderate travel delays. POWER & WATER CONSUMPTION SURGES IN JULY

Did you think this summer was extra hot? Here are some interesting numbers:

- Springville City produced 469.1 million gallons during the month of July. Our peak day was July 12th when we produced 17.6 million gallons.
- The July power consumption was up 8% from July 2017.
- The average residential power usage for July 2018 used 926 kWh.
- One-kilowatt-hour of power will operate an A/C unit of 1000 watts for 1 Hour.

Messages may be sent to the whole community, or just a neighborhood affected. Register your home number, cell phone number & email address. Success of the system depends on YOU! 

FALL IS A GREAT TIME FOR PLANTING TREES

Springville City has general guidelines for trees planted in the public right of way or by commercial and residential developers for screening or landscape barrier purposes. Some of these guidelines are applicable to residents planting new trees in their own yard. See the [Springville City Urban Forestry Page](#) for downloadable guidelines and detailed drawings to insure the success of your new trees. Some of the pointers detailed on the website include:

- Street trees or trees in planter strips must be of an approved species and may only be planted in planter strips that are at least six feet wide with clearance of 7 feet on the sidewalk side and 13 feet on the street side.
- Tree hole shall be dug 2-3 time the diameter of the root ball and only as deep as the root ball.
- Tree should be set in the center of the hole and stood upright. The root flare should be visible and located at, or slightly above, existing ground level. The root flare should never be below ground level.
- Backfill hole with parent material. Compact only enough to hold tree in place. Never use mechanical compaction. Backfill material should cover root flare slightly but should never be piled against trunk.
- Water generously to soak entire root ball and backfill material.
- No more than 1" of mulch on top of root ball. Do not pile mulch against trunk. Fabric under mulch is not necessary for single trees.
- Properly planted trees generally Do Not Require Staking. Any and all staking materials should be removed after one year's time
- Do not cut central leader. Only prune off dead, broken, or damaged branches.
- City staff has the right to prune or remove any tree in the public right-of-way as they deem necessary for the benefit of the public concern and safety.

CROSSWALK SAFETY

The 2018 legislative session made some changes in pedestrian law. School is in session so here is a review of some of the responsibilities of pedestrians and drivers. For more details see [Section 41-6a part 10](#) of the Utah Code.

- The operator of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way by slowing down or stopping if necessary to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a crosswalk when the pedestrian is on the half of the roadway upon which the vehicle is traveling; or when the pedestrian is approaching so closely from the opposite half of the roadway as to be in danger.
- A pedestrian may not suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close as to constitute an immediate hazard.
- The operator of a vehicle approaching a school crosswalk shall come to a complete stop at the school crosswalk if the crosswalk is occupied by a person.
- If a vehicle is stopped at a marked crosswalk or at any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the operator of any other vehicle approaching from the rear may not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.
- A pedestrian crossing a roadway at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on the roadway.
- Between adjacent intersections at which traffic-control signals are in operation, a pedestrian may not cross at any place except in a marked crosswalk.

NEW TECHNIQUE AT THE GOLF COURSE

Hobble Creek Golf Course has implemented several new

practices, including the Air2G2 air injection process. The Air2G2 uses three probes to laterally inject pressurized air up to 12-inches beneath the surface of the soil, in a diameter of up to 9 feet,

reaching deep into the soil profile. Compacted layers form as a result of foot traffic, mechanical traffic and nature's daily wear and tear. These laterally injected air blasts loosen compacted soil immediately, without any disruption to the surface of the turf or the roots below.

The Air2G2 process helps with:

- Compaction: Fractures hardpan layers without disruption to roots or playing surfaces
- Porosity: Lateral air injections increase pore space, promote faster drainage and root development
- Respiration: Forces oxygen in and pushes CO2 and other anaerobic gases out for root zone gas exchange

We have already seen the benefits of this process in several areas. One being in some of our heavier moss spots as the grass is no longer being choked out by the moss since there is air being exchanged with the root system. Second, water has been able to penetrate dry spots which have been locked up since we started relying on our irrigation water in late May. Additionally new root growth has been observed throughout the greens on the course. This process coupled with regular verticutting will take the place of a traditional core aeration program so we don't disrupt the putting surface for every day play.

MILL AND OVERLAY


