



The Springville Historic Preservation Commission will be providing small grants to assist home and building owners in protecting and restoring the exterior of their building for the 2019–2020 year. The grant is for projects that contribute to the historic look and feel of the building and must be visible from the street. Interested citizens and businesses must determine if their building meets the following qualifications:

- Must be on the National Register of Historic Places or located within the Springville National Historic District, be at least 50 years old and considered a ‘contributing’ building
- Can only be used for work on the exterior of the building
- Must be used on elements of the building that are at least 50 years old
- Cannot be used for landscaping
- Cannot be used on building additions that are less than 50 years old

Once a grant is received, but before beginning work, you must select and obtain bids from at least three licensed contractors and submit those bids to the Historic Preservation Commission. The work must be completed by one of the licensed contractors represented in the bids you provide to the Commission.

The Springville Historic Preservation Commission reviews the grant applications. The amount of each grant varies depending on the amount of grant money available and the number of people applying for a grant.

**§4-11-108** Street Tree Planting in Previously Developed Areas

(1) Planting. Planting of street trees in previously developed areas will be approved and supervised by the Director of Buildings and Grounds, or designee. Trees planted in these areas will be of approved species and a sense of uniformity will be maintained where possible. Private citizens may only plant street trees in these areas with the approval of the Director of Buildings and Grounds, or designee. Unapproved plantings may be removed by the City.

(2) Restrictions. Planting of street trees in previously developed areas will generally only occur in planter strips that are seventy-two inches (72”) wide, or wider, or as part of a trail system. Areas with narrow planter strips may not receive new street trees, even if existing trees are removed. Street trees may be removed from areas with narrow planter strips in the interest of public safety.
