

MAGIC AND MACHINE





EBOOKS AND EAUDIOBOOKS



Did you get a new phone or tablet for Christmas? Springville Library can help you get it all set up to check out digital items for free!

One of the most popular services Springville Library offers is access to the Overdrive and RBDigital apps. Overdrive and RBDigital have thousands of eBooks, eAudiobooks, eMagazines, music, and movies that you can check out free of charge.

EBooks and eAudiobooks check out like regular library materials, with the added convenience of downloading right to your phone or tablet. When they are due back, they simply leave your device and become available for another reader, and there are never overdue fines.

With your Springville Library card, you can download Overdrive or RBDigital from your device’s app store, and easily log in with your library card number and PIN (last four numbers of your phone number). From there, you can search for specific titles or browse by genre, audience, or recommended reads.
