Are you planning on fixing up a historic house, apartment building or commercial property this year? If so, you could potentially save 20 to 40% on most of your repair and rehabilitation costs with our Historic Tax Credit programs. Eligible expenses may include:

STORM WATER RUNOFF— SHOULD WE CARE?



Melting snow and rain are considered storm water runoff. It runs off roads, parking lots, driveways, roofs, and yards. As it flows across these surfaces, storm water picks up contaminants such as oils, salts, sediments, fertilizers, pesticides and household chemicals. Contaminated storm water flows into storm drains, ditches, and gutters, and eventually into streams, wetlands and lakes. Contaminants in storm water runoff impair water quality in streams and wetlands, and they can lead to fish kills, loss of wildlife habitat, and public health risks. Uncontrolled storm water runoff is one of the largest remaining sources of water quality impairment in the United States.

As our community grows, more land is covered with hard surfaces. This means more water reaches streams more quickly and is potentially more contaminated. Let's work together to lessen the degree of contamination and help protect local water resources.

You can also help us ease the flooding potential by keeping storm drain inlets near your property clean of debris or by reporting them to the Public Works Department at 801-491-2780.

Mayor's Message

I recently had the opportunity to meet with the leaders of each of our city departments to hear their annual reports. This was a great experience to see all of the amazing things that are happening in Springville. I would like to share some highlights that came from these reports that I feel would be of interest to many in our community.



Our ambulance response times are 6.7 minutes during the day and 12.9 minutes at night.

In 2010 Fire and EMS had 637 calls for service. In 2018 we had 1,853.

We have 489 members at the Senior Center. All members of the City Council qualify to belong!

About 65% of the spots in fitness classes are taken every week.

The average pass holder at the golf course is paying about \$8.70 per 9 holes. That is a pretty large discount.

Use of carts has steadily increased over the years. When we opened Hobble Creek literally had a handful of carts. Last year 73.23% of rounds used a cart.

Power distribution personnel have worked well over 400,000 hours without a lost time accident.

We cleaned 141,470 feet of sewer pipe and had ZERO mainline back-ups.

Water crews fixed 27 main breaks.

We delivered almost 4 BILLION gallons of water with 3.12 billion in culinary, 222 million in our new pressurized irrigation lines and another 308 million in our flood irrigation systems.

Museum staff moved around almost 29,000 pieces of art. They didn't drop any. Although a few high school art works fell off the wall.

Educational staff from the museum visited 233 different schools last year talking about art and the museum.

HR processed 436 new hires during the year. 32 of those were full-time employees.

The library is #2 in circulation per capita and #4 in visitors per capita for the state of Utah.

Our assets to liabilities ratio is 5.55. Apple Inc. is only 1.70. I say, "Invest in Springville!"

43% of all Springville youth between kindergarten and 12th grade participated in a recreation program last year.

In January, Springville Library hosted a community art night, where residents painted over 300 acrylic water drops in their own unique styles. The painted water drops were assembled with fishing line and steel hoops to become Cascading Springs, a sculpture now hanging in the library's entry rotunda. This location allows for the sculpture to be experienced from different angles and with changing effects as the light shines through the windows. Cascading Springs is a nod to the beautiful water elements of our city, such as Hobbles Creek, Bartholomew Pond, and Clyde Recreation Center.
