

NEW ROADWAY 1200 WEST (900 S TO 1500 S)

Springville City will be building a new section of roadway at 1200 West, connecting 1000 South to 1300 South, as well as widening other sections of 1200 West. This is part of the Springville City [Transportation Master Plan](#), which was approved by the City Council on October 18, 2016. The scope of work calls for realigning the intersection at 1200 West and 1300 South, which will require closing that area while the contractor works on it.

Residents will have access to their driveways during construction. The project has been awarded to Landmark Excavating, Inc and completion date is set for August 24, 2019. Eventually 1200 West will become a major north/south arterial connection from 1600 South to 1400 North.



PLEASE MOW WEEDS

As the spring and summer seasons are upon us, the Springville City Community Development Department would like to remind residents that weeds are considered to be a nuisance.

Springville City Code [§12-2-113\(j\)](#) states:

“Noxious weeds located on vacant lots or other property, along public sidewalks or the outer edge of any public street, or weeds in any other location which constitute a fire hazard or are unsightly, [are defined as an enumerated nuisance.] Undeveloped lots which have weeds, grass or other growth which constitute an existing or potential fire hazard shall be abated by the owner of the property.

Weed abatement compliance shall be accomplished by pulling, discing, plowing or mowing weeds within 4 inches of the ground. The City shall survey properties within the City and identify those needing abatement and then serve notice in writing upon the owner or occupant of such land in person or by mailing notice, postage prepaid, addressed to the owner or occupant at the last known post office address as indicated by the records of the county assessor.

The notice shall require the owner, or occupant as the case may be, to abate the weeds by a specific time, which shall not be less than ten (10) days from the date of service of such notice. One notice shall be deemed sufficient on any lot or parcel of property for the entire season of weed growth during that year.”

Please be courteous to your neighbors and keep the weeds from becoming a nuisance. Property owners who do not maintain their property and adjoining public right-of-way may be cited. Thank you for your cooperation in maintaining a clean, attractive and safe community.

If you are looking for a way to become more involved in Springville, consider running for City Council. In 2019, there will be three council seats up for election. Each are four year terms— January 2020-January 2024. If you decide to run for office, file your Declaration of Candidacy from June 03–07, 2019, in the Springville City Recorder’s office between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. at the Civic Center, 110 South Main Street. FALL YOUTH SPORT REGISTRATION



June is the busiest month for signing up for Youth Sports! Please note that if players sign up on time, they are guaranteed a spot in any of these leagues.

FALL SOCCER REGISTRATION IS JUNE 1ST-JUNE 30TH

FLAG FOOTBALL REGISTRATION IS JUNE 1ST-JULY 5TH (THE 7TH-9TH GRADE LEAGUES REGISTERS IN AUGUST)

The registration period for all youth sports is open for about a month. After that time, a maximum number of players for each league is determined. An effort is made to allow for some late registrations, but a limit has to be set so teams can be coordinated. The Recreation staff need to have time to find volunteer parent coaches, assign players to teams, order uniforms, and create game schedules.

After the maximum enrollment is reached for each league, a waiting list is created. Once on the waiting list, the child is in line for any space that might become available. Spaces may become available through drop outs due to injury, scheduling conflicts, unexpected family circumstances, or the child choosing not to play.

Players are called from the waiting list in the order they were added. There are no team requests when being placed from the waiting list. The new player is put on the team that has an opening.

Soccer is the largest Springville youth sport in terms of number of players and number of leagues. Cub Soccer (4 and 5 year olds) alone has up to 5 separate leagues with 10 teams in each league!

The Recreation Department office sends a monthly newsletter to give subscribers advance notice of youth sport registration. The newsletter is sent about 2 weeks before the beginning of each new month. Send requests to be added to the monthly email list to recreation@springville.org.

TREES, LINES AND THE POWER DEPARTMENT

Do you have trees growing into your power lines or house drop? Give the Springville Power Department a call at 801-489-2750. Our dispatch office can arrange to have a line crew come and trim those tree limbs out of the power lines.

It's important that trees be cleared of power lines as they can rub against the lines, causing wear and eventually an outage. Clearing tree limbs from live/energized power lines is extremely dangerous and should only be done by qualified personnel.

FOR COMMUNICATION LINES, YOU WILL NEED TO CONTACT CENTURYLINK OR COMCAST

If you are thinking of removing a tree, we can cut the tree below the power lines. It then can be safely removed by you or by a tree service. Always keep yourself and equipment at least 10 feet from power lines when removing limbs. Keep in mind that the Power Department will only trim tree limbs around the power lines. For communication lines, you will need to contact Centurylink or Comcast. The Power Department also hires a tree service every 2 years to safely remove limbs from power lines of targeted trees in the City. The tree service will notify you in advance if the trees in your yard need to be trimmed and will also remove the debris from your yard.

If a tree limb has fallen on your power lines due to a storm or snow, please call the power dispatch office at 801-489-2750 (24 hrs) to report it and we can dispatch a lineman to come assess the situation and safely remove the tree or limb from the lines.

For public owned trees that appear to be dead, dying or diseased, that have large broken limbs, low limbs or limbs blocking traffic signs, signals or intersection sight lines, please call the Springville City Urban Forestry Staff at 801-489-2737 or 801-489-2770.

We love our trees in Springville. They are beautiful and provide lots of shade and oxygen. Sometimes, however, they can be a hazard and the Power Department is here to help.
