

UTILITY RATE INCREASES


Springville City's longstanding policy on utility rate changes has historically been to make regular small adjustments to keep up with increasing costs as necessary to avoid the need to make large rate changes. As such, the City Council has approved a 2.5% increase in both residential and commercial utility rates. This equates to \$3 to \$4 per month on the average home.

A recent study commissioned by Provo City shows Springville City has the lowest overall utility rates in Utah County (<https://www.provo.org/Home/ShowDocument?id=15403>). Additionally, our neighboring communities are proposing utility rate increases ranging from 5% to 15%.

Springville utilities affected by this 2.5% rate increase are:

- Residential & Commercial Water (drinking water and secondary water).
- Sewer Collection & Treatment
- Storm Water Collection & Disposal
- Residential & Small Commercial Power
- Residential Municipal Solid Waste & Recycling

Springville City makes every effort to keep utility rates low, while providing reliable services and planning for the future. Increases will be seen in the city's August utility bill.




RETURN YOUR BALLOTS TODAY

SPRINGVILLE CITY PRIMARY ELECTION

TUESDAY, AUGUST 13, 2019

Ballots were mailed out in July. You may return your ballot via mail, but it must be postmarked by August 12, the day before the election. In addition, you can simply return your ballot to any Utah County ballot drop box, including the Springville City Civic Center at 110 South Main Street. See vote.utah.gov for locations.



STORM DRAIN WATCH/STORM WATER TREATMENT

Rain typically soaks into the ground, but in cities where pavement and other hard surfaces are common, the water instead flows over streets, parking lots and roofs into the storm drain system. Fertilizers, pet and yard waste, oil and gas spilling from cars; pollute the storm water.

Many people believe that storm water is treated before it is released into our streams (Hobble Creek, Dry Creek and Spring Creek) that eventually end up in Utah Lake, but the fact is that most storm water is not treated at the wastewater treatment plant. Springville City employs many means to handle storm water and disperse it downstream. Periodically, algae blooms at Utah Lake cause unsafe conditions, particularly in Provo Bay, where our streams enter the lake.



HOW CAN YOU HELP?

While the City is trying to assure the storm water is as clean as possible before being discharged into our streams and Utah Lake, there is plenty a Springville resident can do to keep the storm water clean. Clean water is everyone's responsibility.

- Apply fertilizer responsibly; fertilizer on hard surfaces eventually makes it to the storm drain system, which can cause algae blooms in Utah Lake. Sweep the gutters in front of your house
- Stop blowing leaves and grass clippings onto the street
- Pick up litter
- Drop off used oil and other petroleum products at official oil recycling drop off centers
- Clean up after your pets
- Dispose of household chemicals responsibly



PET LICENSING & LOW COST RABIES CLINIC

Springville City, SUVAS (South Utah Valley Animal Shelter) and a local veterinarian will provide rabies shots for \$12 and other vaccinations for \$15 to \$25. Animal Licenses are \$15 for altered (spayed/neutered) and \$35 for unaltered. Saturday, August 10, 2019 10 a.m. - 12 p.m. SUVAS will be giving a bag of dog treats away to owners who purchase a license. (one bag per family while supplies last).
