

## WINTER TIPS FOR CLEAN WATER



De-icers lower the melting point of ice to help remove ice and snow from pavement. Springville City uses a product with trace minerals like magnesium chloride, potassium chloride and calcium chloride which helps them use less and it melts snow and ice faster than rock salt.

### KEEP OUR WATER SUPPLY CLEANER

- BE SURE TO KEEP DE-ICERS IN A COVERED AREA TO PREVENT RUNOFF AND CONTAMINATION OF GROUND WATER THROUGH THE STORM SYSTEM.
- ALWAYS APPLY DE-ICING PRODUCTS ACCORDING TO THE MANUFACTURER'S INSTRUCTIONS.
- SHOVELING ELIMINATES ICE AND SNOW WITHOUT HARMFUL CHEMICALS WITH THE ADDED BENEFIT OF EXERCISE. USE CAUTION TO AVOID INJURY.

Polluted water that enters your storm drain (the grate in the street curb that collects water runoff) does not get treated, and instead flows directly into local water bodies where it can harm aquatic life and habitats, contaminate drinking water supplies and recreational waterways, and lessen aesthetic value.



### RESIDENTIAL SEWER LATERAL



The pipe that carries residential sewage waste from your home to the City's sewer main pipeline in the street is called a residential sewer lateral. Sewer backups are an unfortunate, but common problem in residential sewer laterals due to lack of homeowner maintenance or misuse by allowing the wrong items to enter the sewer lateral.

#### PREVENT SEWER LATERAL DAMAGE

- AVOID PUTTING GREASE DOWN YOUR GARBAGE DISPOSAL
- NEVER FLUSH DIAPERS, WIPES OR PAPER TOWELS DOWN YOUR TOILET
- PLANT LARGE BUSHES AND TREES AWAY FROM THE SEWER LATERAL
- IN THE BASEMENT, INSTALL A BACK-FLOW VALVE ON THE LOWEST DRAIN

Springville City makes every effort to prevent sewer back-ups in the main pipelines owned by the City by scheduling regular pipe cleaning and maintenance through the system. Maintenance and repair of a resident sewer are the home-owner's responsibility. The illustration above shows a general illustration of the residential sewer lateral and its connection to the City's mainline. The homeowner is responsible for the lateral out into the street where it connects to the main line.
