One hundred years ago, in 1920, a special election was held to bond for the building of a free library for the citizens of Springville. The bond covered \$15,000 and the Carnegie Corporation donated \$10,000. The first librarian was Miss Louisa Rowland, who took a course in library science and served until 1963. The Springville Historical Society is still housed in that building.

Today's library opened in 2011 and was awarded Best of State in 2019. 4 out of 5 Springville households have a library card and use the library at least once a year. Over 44,962 people attended programs in 2019 and 667.272 items were checked out from the print and digital catalog.

and sports. We will try to keep you all informed on upcoming events by keeping the city website and schedules updated and through our Springville Facebook page.



SALT LAKE CITY - The Utah Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) wants residents to know that their public water supply is safe. In the case of quarantine or outbreak related to the coronavirus, public drinking water systems are designed to continuously deliver safe drinking water to your tap.

"Drinking water treatment and disinfection has effectively protected Utah's population for many decades. These protections will safeguard residents against drinkingwater-borne viral infections—including coronavirus," says Marie Owens, Director of DEQ's Division of Drinking Water. "There is no need for residents to stock up on surplus bottled water in preparation for a potential outbreak of coronavirus."

#### WAYNE BARTHOLOMEW FAMILY PARK

Springville City operates and maintains the Wayne Bartholomew Family Park. Located within the park are pavilions, a beach, restroom, concession operations, open grass areas, and a pond for fishing that are all available for the public to enjoy. ## **PARKING PASSES**

Parking Passes are available at the Civic Center cashier windows, Clyde Recreation Center, and the Community Service Building. None of the staff at those locations can deviate from written policy. Passes are available beginning April 1st of each year and are in affect from May 1st - September 30th

Resident and patron parking at the park from October 1st - April 30th does not require a pass.

ONE parking pass allowed per household or business. No printing at home. Springville resident second vehicles must follow outside of city limit rules. If a pass is lost or misplaced a person may request another in writing to hpenni@springville.org or bneel@springville.org

## PASS ELIGIBILITY

## VALIDATION/PROOF OF RESIDENCE

Bring a photo ID WITH a utility bill, property tax statement, or current month credit card/cell phone bill showing your name and address that is here in Springville.

#### SPRINGVILLE RESIDENT/HOMEOWNER:

If you live within Springville City boundaries and pay property taxes to Springville City. OR, occupy a rental property from a landlord, your household gets one free parking pass.

### LANDLORD OF RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY:

A landlord who may or may not live in Springville City boundaries but pays property taxes to the city is entitled to ONE pass regardless of number of dwellings owned.

If you own a business in Springville and the building is owned by the business owner/landlord who in turn pays property taxes to the city, you are eligible for one parking pass. Please bring proof of ownership.
