

NOTICE TO SPRINGVILLE UTILITY CUSTOMERS

State law requires that the City provide an annual disclosure of money transferred from an enterprise fund (typically a utility service) to any other fund of the City. Springville's Fiscal Year 2021 Tentative Budget includes a set percentage transfer of five percent of operating revenues from each of the utility enterprise funds (Water, Sewer, Electric, Storm Drain, and Solid Waste) to the City's General Fund. The transfer amount also includes the value of utilities provided to the general fund at no charge. Transfers are amounts that cannot be defined as reasonable allocations of costs between funds and are not typically repaid.

As has been its practice for many years, the City of Springville has budgeted for the transfer of money from its utility enterprise funds to the general fund as a return on investment to its shareholders, the Springville City rate payers. These funds are used each year to help cover costs of important city services like police, fire, library, senior center, parks, recreation and other city functions. The utility transfer helps keep property taxes low in Springville.

Separate from these operating transfers, the enterprise funds pay an administrative charge to cover the costs of centralized services provided by the general fund to the enterprise funds. These services include but are not limited to utility billing, accounting, payroll, legal, human resources, engineering and facility maintenance. These administrative fees are calculated by the Finance Department and are considered to be reasonable allocations of costs between funds.

The following are Fiscal Year 2021 transfers and administrative fees (budgeted not to exceed):

The Tentative Budget will be considered by the City Council in their regular meeting on May 5, 2020 with a public hearing to be set for Tuesday, June 16, 2020 at 7:00 p.m. at the City Council Chambers located at the Springville City Center, 110 South Main Street, Springville, Utah. Because of the COVID Pandemic, these meetings may be all electronic meetings. For instructions on how to sign in to the electronic meetings, refer to each meeting's public notice. The public hearing will be to discuss the proposed dividend transfer in the Fiscal Year 2021 Budget and the adoption of the Tentative Budget as the Final Budget for the 2021 fiscal year.


As Memorial Day approaches, we remind you of a few guidelines at the cemeteries;

- PLEASE DON'T BRING SHEPARD HOOKS, FOOD, DRINKS, LIGHTS OR GLASS CONTAINERS TO DECORATE A GRAVE.
- FLOWERS AND TRIBUTES CAN BE LEFT FOR SEVEN DAYS WITH CLEAN UP COMMENCING ON MONDAYS. THE CREWS DO THEIR BEST TO TAKE CARE OF THE TRIBUTES, BUT MANY NEED TO BE REMOVED FOR LAWN SERVICES.
- IN ADDITION, THE POWER DEPARTMENT REQUESTS NO MYLAR BALLOONS, AS THEY CAUSE OUTAGES. AND EXPENSIVE DAMAGE TO OUR POWER GRID.

One-hundred percent of your donation will go toward helping families and individuals who have fallen on hard times.



Per City code, the Hardship Committee decides on a case-by-case basis to grant relief to applicants seeking help with their utility bill "due to a financial hardship or indigent circumstances." The committee will determine whether a contribution from the fund or an extension of time should be granted.

CODE ENFORCEMENT TRANSFERRED TO THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Recently, Springville City Council voted to transfer the duties of code enforcement to the Police Department from the Community Development. The purpose of code enforcement is to protect the health and safety of the public, to foster neighborhood stability, to preserve the appearance, character and beauty of neighborhoods, to encourage community pride, to preserve the value of property, and to protect the general welfare of the City and its citizens, businesses and visitors.

Common problems are weeds, standing water, dead vegetation, fire hazards, unreasonable odors, junk, abandoned household appliances, hazardous trees, construction equipment, parking on the sidewalk, broken fences, graffiti, property unsafe for occupancy, and a myriad of other violations. ITS REALLY EASY TO GO ONLINE AND FILL OUT YOUR CENSUS QUESTIONNAIRE



Over seventy million households across America have already responded to the 2020 Census questionnaire. That represents over 48% of all households in America.

The 2020 Census questionnaire will take about 10 minutes to complete. It's safe, secure, and confidential. Your information and privacy are protected. Your response helps to direct billions of dollars in federal funds to local communities for schools, roads, and other public services. Results from the 2020 Census will be used to determine the number of seats each state has in Congress and your political representation at all levels of government.

If you leave the questionnaire and return later, you will have to start over. You must complete your questionnaire once you begin. Do not use the web browser buttons (back, forward, or close browser). Use the buttons within the questionnaire to navigate. For best results, use the latest version of Chrome, Firefox, Internet Explorer, or Safari and enable cookies.

In light of the COVID-19 outbreak, the Census Bureau temporarily suspended 2020 Census field data collection activities in March. Steps are already being taken to reactivate field offices beginning June 1, 2020. If you have not logged in and filled out the 10 minute questionnaire at my2020census.gov expect a field visit from a census employee in June.
