Things will eventually get back



## CODE ENFORCEMENT UPDATE

Springville Police Chief Craig Martinez welcomes Officer Burl Willardson as the new Code Enforcement Officer. Officer Willardson is a local Utahan with 20 years of military experience and 18 months of previous law enforcement experience. He has taken on this duty with pride and is committed to keeping the city of Springville a beautiful and exceptional place to live. In his first month, he has made note of the following most common city code violations:

### PARKING

- Parking left of center (please do not park with the driver side to curb)
- Parking perpendicular to the street
- Parking on landscaping
- Parking half the vehicle in the park strip on some roads such as 400 South
- Abandoned vehicles, unregistered vehicles, and disassembled vehicles on public roads

### RESIDENCE/YARDS

- Building or changing structures to include fences, sheds, and homes without permits
- Weeds or grass taller than 6 inches
- Improper accumulation of soil, litter, debris, plant trimmings, and trash visible from the street or adjoining property
- Trees and shrubbery obstructing a right of way (sidewalks)
- Improper parking or storage (which refers to any vehicle, or parts of a vehicle, which is in a wrecked, junked, partially dismantled, or inoperative condition, on any property in the city for more than seventy-two hours. The exception to this ordinance is that two or fewer such vehicles may be stored within a building or placed behind an opaque screening fence that is six feet in height.)



Officer Willardson has also noticed a significant portion of the violations contributing to the unacceptable appearance of properties are occurring on vacant properties. The most common of these violations have been weeds more than 6 inches in height, and the accumulation of junk, litter, garbage, and construction materials. Officer Willardson and the Springville police department are specifically asking that the owners of such properties maintain their properties according to the codes of Springville City to help keep the appearance of our city clean and orderly.

The City of Springville, Springville Police Department, and Officer Willardson need your help in keeping our city presentable by maintaining your private properties and avoiding the most common violations mentioned above. ## CITY-WIDE CERT DISASTER DRILL



The City-Wide CERT Disaster Drill is coming Saturday, September 5, 2020. At 7:30 a.m. hundreds of Block Captains will start walking their blocks.

They will be checking the status of every household in their block by looking for a color marker posted in a front window or door. If they see red, it is a signal immediate help is needed. Yellow indicates help is needed but can wait until later, green tells the Block Captain all is well, and no help is needed, a black marker is to be posted if there is a death in the household.

We would like the public to post markers this way Block Captains can quickly check on a household without having to go up and knock on each door. It also allows Block Captains to gather a lot of information in the shortest amount of time.

The best time to post your marker cards would be Friday evening unless you want to get up early before 7:30 a.m. Saturday. The city prefers that markers be 8 1/2 x 11 sheets of colored paper. If you don't already have a kit with red, yellow, green and black sheets there is still plenty of time to buy what you need at any place selling colored paper.

For this drill, all citizens are asked to post a green card. However, a certain number of citizens will be asked beforehand to post a red marker. The number will be reported to the City Emergency Operations Center. Then when the Block Captains report how many red markers they saw, we can measure the effectiveness of the Block Captains and their communication with the City Emergency Operations Center.

This drill depends on a lot of people participating including the general public, so please mark your calendars for September 5, 2020, and then get your marker kits. This way you will be ready just in case there is a real disaster.

## FALL SPORTS DEADLINE IS JULY 10, 2020

Youth sports registrations for fall programs are now open in good faith that the Utah County Covid-19 level will remain at yellow or green. Springville Rec will cancel these programs if heavier restrictions are put back into place for our area.

Fall Soccer—Divisions are based on current age or school grade. Cub—cost is \$35 and includes a team shirt (age 4 through Kindergarten) 1<sup>st</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> Grades—cost is \$30 (add \$13 for a new Springville jersey if needed) **JERSEYS MUST BE PURCHASED SEPARATELY IF NEEDED.** Springville jerseys from recent past years can be used if they fit. Red/Blue for boys and Pink/Blue for girls. A \$10 late fee will be added after the deadline. A \$10 fee will be added for non-Springville residents.
