

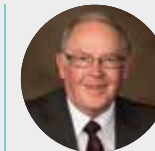

SPRINGVILLE MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT

Springville is a third-class city (population between 30,000 and 65,000) with a six-member council form of government. The 2018 U.S. Census Bureau estimated Springville's population to be 33,104. Council offices are held for four-year terms. The Mayor is the Chief Executive of Springville, administrative powers, authority, and duties of the city are vested in the mayor, and they may only vote in the case of a tie. The Mayor with the advice and consent of the city council may appoint all officers and agents of the City. In order to pass any measure a quorum of three council members is needed.



City Council meetings are held on the First and Third Tuesdays of each month at 7:00 p.m. Work meetings are held on the First, Second, and Third Tuesdays of each month at 5:30 p.m. all meetings are open to the public. Council work meetings are held to give the Council and staff opportunities to discuss current issues and listen to presentations from staff and others. No decisions are made at these meetings, and public comment generally is not taken. Regular council meetings are held to discuss, receive comments from the public, or act upon a matter over which the public body has jurisdiction or advisory power.

Agendas for these meetings are posted publicly no less than 24 hours before each meeting. To receive notification of these agendas, go to utah.gov/pmn/index.html and subscribe to Springville City Council.

Currently, there are 18 boards and commissions. Some are seated by appointed citizens of Springville. springville.org/administration/files/2020/08/2020-Boards-and-Commissions_redacted.pdf

A city council member is assigned to each board or commission as well as outside boards and commissions. City council members spend about ten to twenty hours per week on their council responsibilities.

CITY CODE NEED TO KNOWS

Dogs and cats and fowl oh my! Any domesticated animal at large at any time is unlawful within the limits of the City. (Springville City Code §3-7-111)



One cat, two cat, red dog, blue dog. Each household may have no more than two dogs and two cats. (Springville City Code §3-7-304)

It is unlawful for an owner of an animal to fail to clean up "waste" and properly dispose of it, please, please clean up after your animals. (Springville City Code §3-7-113)

YARD WASTE CLOSES FOR SEASON

Bring your yard waste to the Yard Waste Disposal Center at 600 West 700 North Tuesday through Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. The yard will be closed Thanksgiving Day, but open the Friday after and the last day is that Saturday, November 28, 2020.

Show proof of Springville residency before using the facility. Non-residents will be charged a fee or they can take their yard waste to the South Utah Valley Solid Waste District (Transfer Station) at 2450 West 400 South in Springville. Clean up, clean up; everybody everywhere! Thank you for making Springville pretty!

WINTER SESSION BASKETBALL

Pre-K to 2nd Grades, registration is open through November 13, 2020. For 9th to 12th Grades, registration is open through November 15, 2020.

CANVASS 2020

Do you know what an election canvass is? It sounds like a candidate knocking on doors, but this is different. The final tally of all eligible ballots after an election is called the election canvass, also known as the certification of the election.

Each type of government has a different way of certifying an election. In Utah, the state board of canvassers includes the State Treasurer, State Auditor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, and the Director of the Elections. They are required by state code to meet on the 4th Monday of November to certify the final election results in any state elections at the capitol building.

In Utah County, the board of canvassers is the county commission. By state code, the county elections cannot be certified before seven days after the election and no later than 14 days after the election. The board can include the county treasurer, assessor or sheriff if a commissioner is absent.

By the same code, Springville City elections are certified by the mayor and council in the same time period as above.

The duties of a board of canvasses can be found at Utah State Code §20A-4-303. Thank you for voting.

PASSPORTS BY APPOINTMENT ONLY

Springville City offers new passport services by appointment only. Call 801.489.2700 to make your appointment Monday through Friday 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The State Department has notified all Passport Acceptance Agencies that routine turn around is 10-12 weeks. For an extra \$60, expedited service is 4-6 weeks. Most passport renewals can be done at home; just get a passport photo and mail in the application with appropriate payment and your old passport.
