2021 GOLF SEASON BEGINS



The 2021 golf season is about to begin. This year there are a few changes that will affect the way the course operates and players make and pay for tee times. These changes will create a smoother course operation and accommodate the higher than average anticipated play.

The primary method to make a golf course reservation will be on-line at springville.org/golf (click on the "book a tee time" button). Reservations over the phone will continue to be an option, but mainly for punch cards, special rates (city employees, juniors, and Youth on Course players), gift cards and groups.

All play this year will be prepaid at the time of booking whether on-line or over the phone. Punch card players will still check in at the pro-shop to have their cards punched. Reservations can be 5 days in advance this year, but again payment for the entire tee time is required at the time of booking.

We will also offer junior golf clinics, ladies golf clinics, junior play league, men's association, and ladies association. All of these programs are designed to get players of all abilities out to learn to golf, play with friends, and enjoy the beauty of Hobbie Creek Canyon.

2021 is a year full of changes and we are looking forward to a great golf season. See you on the links!!

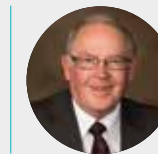

BASEBALL-SOFTBALL-KICKBALL

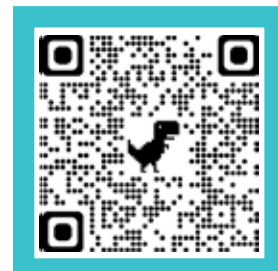

If you are getting "Spring Fever" and looking forward to getting your lawns and gardens ready for the year, don't forget—

**RULE #1 OF PROPER LAWN MAINTENANCE:
DON'T WATER TOO EARLY IN THE SEASON**

Depending on the weather, you can usually wait to turn on the sprinkler system until sometime in May. Grass is typically dormant until late March and the longer you wait to water, the stronger your grass roots will become.

THE RECAP-RECENT HAPPENINGS AROUND TOWN

The Yard Waste Facility, located at 600 West 700 North, opens March 2, 2021. Hours are Tuesday through Saturday 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; closed Sundays & holidays.

COMPOST SEASON

Composted materials suitable for soil enhancement are available for purchase (cash or check only) at \$25.00 per cubic yard, \$13.00 per 1/2 cubic yard for residents; \$36.00 per cubic yard, \$18.00 per 1/2 cubic yard for non-residents.

SPRING CEMETERY CLEAN UP

Please remove decorations you have placed on graves by Sunday, March 7, 2021 or they may be removed and disposed of by cemetery personnel.

CITY CODE NEED TO KNOWS:



Throughout Springville City, there are a variety of commercial and industrial areas that are all important to the vitality of the City. Within residential areas, needs for signs are also important, but should not take away from the residential nature



of the area. Sign districts are used to regulate signs. ([Sign district map](#))

Public Property – except for signs owned and installed by a government agency, or installed by permission of a government agency, no sign shall be erected on, over or across publicly owned property, or inside a public street right-of-way, or located within a public right-of-way. 8. Books are available even when the building is closed. With the apps Overdrive and Libby, you can browse and check out e-books, e-audiobooks, or even magazines and movies on your device.
