

**PUBLIC HEARING—NOTICE OF MUNICIPAL BOUNDARY ADJUSTMENT**

The Springville City Council has adopted a resolution indicating its intent to adjust a boundary that Springville City and Spanish Fork City have in common. The proposed adjustment will add approximately 1.87 acres from Springville City to Spanish Fork City area and add 4.85 acres from Spanish Fork City to Springville City area. The adjustment affects Utah County Parcel Nos. 26:045:0108 located at approximately 940 South 2000 West, Spanish Fork (Springville address), and 66:273:0019 at approximately 808 S. Frontage Road, Springville. A copy of the proposed boundary adjustment plat is on file in the office of the Springville City Recorder.

A public hearing has been scheduled for June 01, 2021, at 7 p.m. or as soon thereafter as reasonably practicable. The public hearing will be held at the Springville City Civic Center, Council Chambers, 110 South Main Street, Springville, Utah. The Springville City Council will adjust the boundary between it and Spanish Fork City as described in the boundary adjustment plat unless, at or before the public hearing, a written protest to the adjustment is filed by an owner of private real property that is located within the area proposed for adjustment, covering at least 25% of the total private land area within the area proposed for adjustment and equal in value to at least 15% of the value of all private real property within the area proposed for adjustment, or by a title holder of state-owned real property.

The area that is the subject of the boundary adjustment will, because of the boundary adjustment, be automatically annexed to a local district providing fire protection, paramedic, and emergency services or a local district providing law enforcement service, as the case may be, as provided in Section 17B-1-416, if: (i) the municipality to which the area is being added because of the boundary adjustment is entirely within the boundaries of a local district: (A) that provides fire protection, paramedic, and emergency services or law enforcement service, respectively; and (B) in the creation of which an election was not required because of Subsection 17B-1-214(3)(c); and (ii) the municipality from which the area is being taken because of the boundary adjustment is not within the boundaries of the local district. Furthermore, the area proposed for annexation to the municipality will be automatically withdrawn from a local district providing fire protection, paramedic, and emergency services, as provided in Subsection 17B-1-502(2), if: (i) the municipality to which the area is being added because of the boundary adjustment is not within the boundaries of a local district: (A) that provides fire protection, paramedic, and emergency services; and (B) in the creation of which an election was not required because of Subsection 17B-1-214(3)(c); and (ii) the municipality from which the area is being taken because of the boundary adjustment is entirely within the boundaries of the local district. **NOTICE TO SPRINGVILLE UTILITY CUSTOMERS**



State law requires that the City provide an annual disclosure of money transferred from an enterprise fund (typically a utility service) to any other fund of the City. Springville’s Fiscal Year 2022 Tentative Budget includes a set percentage transfer of five percent of operating revenues from each of the utility enterprise funds (Water, Sewer, Electric, Storm Drain, and Solid Waste) to the City’s General Fund. The transfer amount also includes the value of utilities provided to the general fund at no charge. Additionally, the budget includes a transfer of two percent of the budget of Enterprise Fund capital projects to support the “Percentage for the Arts” program, which promotes public art in Springville. Transfers are amounts that cannot be defined as reasonable allocations of costs between funds and are not typically repaid.

As has been its practice for many years, the City of Springville has budgeted for the transfer of money from its utility enterprise funds to the general fund as a return on investment to its shareholders, the Springville City rate payers. These funds are used each year to help cover costs of important city services like police, fire, library, senior center, parks, recreation and other city functions. The utility transfer helps keep property taxes low in Springville.

Separate from these operating transfers, the enterprise funds pay an administrative charge to cover the costs of centralized services provided by the general fund to the enterprise funds. These services include but are not limited to utility billing, accounting, payroll, legal, human resources, engineering and facility maintenance. These administrative fees are calculated by the Finance Department and are considered to be reasonable allocations of costs between funds.

The Tentative Budget will be considered by the City Council in their regular meeting on May 4, 2021 with a public hearing to be set for Tuesday, June 1, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. at the City Council Chambers located at the Springville City Center, 110 South Main Street, Springville, Utah. The public hearing will be to discuss the proposed dividend transfer in the Fiscal Year 2022 Budget and the adoption of the Tentative Budget as the Final Budget for the 2022 fiscal year.

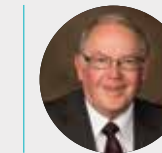

## WATER RESTRICTIONS? MAYBE.

At this point, there are not any restrictions on outdoor water use for Springville City. We hope that we can work together to conserve water and avoid any restrictions this summer.



Here are a few tips to help you conserve:

- Water your lawn only during the cooler parts of the day (from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 a.m.) and don't over water.
- Adjust your lawn mower to a higher setting. Longer grass shades root systems and holds soil moisture better.
- Get rid of those weeds! They're ugly and they rob water from other plants/grass. Fewer weeds mean all around less water use for your landscape.
- Consider replacing infrequently used lawn areas with low-water use plants or ground covers.
- Turn your sprinkler system off during or after a rainstorm and leave it off until the plants need to be watered again.
- Avoid watering your lawn on windy days.
- Try to add more days between watering. Allowing your lawn to dry out between watering creates deeper roots and allows you water deeper and less often.
- Quickly fix leaks. A leaky faucet can waste thousands of gallons of water and raise your water bill.
- Wash cars on the lawn or at a commercial car wash that recycles water.
- Sweep your driveways and sidewalks with a broom instead of spraying them off with a hose.

Springville City provides thirty-one (31) public parks to its residents Twenty-seven (27) of those are located within the city limits and four (4) are located in Hobble Creek Canyon.

City parks play a vital role in the social, economic, and physical well-being of Springville City. The mission statement of the Grounds division at Springville City states, "Working together to provide safe places of beauty, distinction, and happiness for the enjoyment of all." A goal of the Grounds division is that City owned parks/properties/trees have character and purpose that benefit the City for physical, intellectual, social and emotional well-being.

### PARKS ARE ESSENTIAL BECAUSE

- they encourage active lifestyles which reduces health costs;
- they strengthen local economies which creates jobs;
- they make cities more resilient;
- they increase community engagement which reduces crime;
- they help clean the air which improves public health;
- they are a tool for cities to achieve their equity goals.

Springville City supports the three values that make parks essential services outlined by the National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA): Parks have economic value; parks provide health and environmental benefits; parks support social importance.

The Buildings and Grounds Department is responsible for all city owned parks/properties and we hope Springville City residents continue to enjoy our parks. The Parks, Recreation and Trails Master Plan is currently being revised to enhance our park systems and encourage our residents use parks and trails for their benefit.
