## A STATE OF EMERGENCY DUE TO DROUGHT CONDITIONS

In March 2021, Governor Spencer J. Cox issued an Executive Order declaring a state of emergency due to drought conditions. As you are aware, 100% of Utah is in drought. 2020 was one of the hottest and driest summers on record, our snowpack was well below average this year, and soil moisture is at an all-time low. Taking action NOW is critical!

### RECOMMENDATIONS & CONSIDERATIONS DURING DROUGHT:

- Fix those dripping faucets! On average, leaks make up about 14% of all indoor water use.
- Test your sprinklers occasionally when you can watch each station, to make sure there are no broken heads or watering of driveways and sidewalks.
- Outdoor watering: limit outdoor irrigation to 1-2 days per week. Be sure to turn off your automatic sprinklers if it has rained recently. Avoid watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.
- Postpone new landscape projects until a wetter year.
- Take advantage of rebates to replace inefficient indoor fixtures and appliances with water-efficient models. Visit [utahwatersavers.com](http://utahwatersavers.com) for more information on smart irrigation controllers and toilet replacement.
- Reduce your daily showers by one minute to save 1,875 gallons per year.

## SALES TAX AND THE RAP TAX

Some cities (or counties) impose a 0.10% sales tax for Recreational Facilities and Botanical, Cultural and Zoological Organizations. This tax is known by many acronyms (RAP, ZAP, CARES, PARK, etc.). Most Utah County cities have voted to implement this tax, but not yet in Springville. In November, residents will have the opportunity to decide at the ballot box if this tax should be levied in Springville with revenue being dedicated to recreation, arts and parks facilities and operations.



You may have wondered why sales tax exists and what happens to it after you pay it. Sales tax is the single largest revenue source for Springville City's general fund. The FY 2022 budget anticipates nearly \$7.5 million in sales tax revenue to support general governmental services. Sales tax formulas change from time to time and the sales tax rules can be complex, but here are a few explanations to perhaps answer some of your questions.

Many policymakers feel sales tax is a better option than other types of taxes because (a) it has a relatively low rate and a broad base (what is and isn't taxable) so the impact to those paying the tax is less significant than other forms of taxation and (b) it raises a significant amount of money without generally causing people to avoid the tax by distorting their spending behavior.

Tax rates vary by state and locality, but in most states, taxpayers pay a combined rate between six and nine percent. On average, Utahns pay just over seven percent on retail sales. In many states, including Utah, groceries are either not taxed or taxed at a reduced rate. Also, sales tax is usually applied to the final retail sale of goods and services, not intermediate business-to-business transactions so as to avoid the tax burden stacking up throughout the supply chain.

While you pay sales tax to the retailer who sells you a product, the retailer doesn't keep the money. There are actually a number of other taxing entities that are imposing the tax and receiving the revenue. The retailer remits the tax to the State and the State Tax Commission distributes the revenue to the entities that imposed the tax. Not all cities and counties impose the same taxes or the same rates, so your sales tax could be different if you bought something somewhere else. In Springville you pay 7.15%, in Spanish Fork or Orem you pay 7.25%, in Park City you pay 8.0% and in St. George you pay 6.75%.



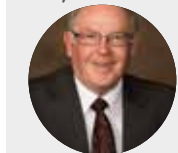

## SUMMER IS ON ITS WAY!

Hotter temperatures increase the energy consumption in Springville by 20 Megawatts to 25 Megawatts. A few changes today will help save you money and help decrease the power needs of the City.

Some of the tips below are free and can be used on a daily basis to increase your savings; others are simple and inexpensive changes you can take to keep your usage down for the long-term.

Turn off lights, computers, TV's.

Turn off ceiling fans when you leave the room.

Install window coverings.

Set your thermostat at a temperature you find comfortable not a colder setting.

Schedule regular maintenance for your heating and cooling equipment.

Avoid placing lamps or TV sets near your thermostat.

Regularly vacuum air intake vents. Move any furniture blocking the airflow. Consider closing vents in rooms that are vacant or rarely used.

A lower setting (120°) on your water heater will prevent scalding and will conserve energy and money. Water heating accounts for about 18% of the energy consumed in your home.

### SOUTH UTAH VALLEY RABIES & LICENSING CLINIC

To get a license, your dog must have a current rabies vaccination certificate as well as a rabies tag. The law requires that a current rabies tag and a license tag be attached to the collar of your dog at all times. The price of the license depends on whether your dog has been spayed or neutered as well as the length of the license.
